The Council on Teaching typically meets six times during the academic year. The timing of meetings is based in part on the application deadlines of the various awards administered by the Council. Meetings are held at 3:30 in the afternoon and alternate between Mondays and Tuesdays.
Current Year Activities	 Jean Florman and Anna Flaming from the Center for Teaching gave a presentation to the Council on the Center's activities. discussed guidelines and nomination procedures for the newly established Hubbard-Walder Award for Excellence in Teaching. discussed the Council's charter and possible changes based on a request from the President of the Faculty Senate. agreed to award Teaching in Higher Education Travel Award funds to participants in online conferences and workshops due to the COVID-19 pandemic in the Spring 2021 and Summer 2021 award cycles. reviewed applications for the Teaching in Higher Education Travel Award and selected recipients. reviewed applications for the President and Provost Award for Teaching Excellence and selected recipients. made changes to the required nomination materials for the President and Provost Award, removing two items from the list of required materials that were felt to be redundant. reviewed applications for the Outstanding Teaching Assistant Awards and selected recipients. reviewed applications for the Hubbard-Walder Award for Excellence in Teaching and selected recipients.
Topics your committee anticipates addressing during the coming year	One issue brought up in Council discussions is the lack of a teaching award for early-career faculty. The President and Provost Award typically goes to faculty members with very long careers at the university and the guidelines for the new Hubbard-Walder Award also favor those who have been at the university for many years. It was suggested that one or two of the new Hubbard-Walder Awards (up to five may be given per year) could be designated as an award specifically for faculty who are early in their careers. The donor funding the Hubbard-Walder Award did not wish to do this in the first year of the award but is open to revisiting the idea in the future. The Council should revisit the topic and consider approaching the donor if there is still support for the idea.
Other issues of concern	The number of applications for the Teaching in Higher Education Travel Award was down considerably from previous years and the Council awarded only a small portion of the available funds. This drop in applications was most likely due to the cancellation of conferences due to the COVID-19 pandemic, but the Council may need to reconsider the award guidelines if the number of applications does not rebound in coming years.
